General Programme Information

Programme Outline: The BASS programme is a modular degree, combining core and elective modules relating to social scientific research and study, as well as modules that are strongly focussed on enhancing students' contemporary skills and employability. Students will be given a broad understanding of the Social Sciences in years one and two, undertake career development and an internship with an NGO or SME in year three, and choose a specific study pathway in year four that is most suited to their planned career or further education pathway. The Academic Regulations Committee and Academic Standing confirm that **the final grade for all BASS graduates will be based on 30% Second Year results and 70% of final year results**.

Progression to Year Three: <u>Students should note that this is a pass-by-module</u> <u>programme and students are, therefore, required to pass all programme modules to</u> <u>progress to Year Three.</u>

Our Vision for the Programme: This programme has a contemporary focus on equipping students with relevant skills in the Social Sciences to advance their preferred career choice, or to avail of further educational opportunities at the Masters and Doctoral levels. Students will engage with and seek to address present-day critical social, environmental and economic issues with creativity, innovation and entrepreneurship in a cooperative and supportive learning environment.

Student Representative: Students are encouraged to have a collective voice in the ongoing design and running of the Bachelor of Science (Social Sciences) programme. The student representative(s) is a point person to convey student issues and concerns directly to the Programme Year Coordinator and/or Programme Team.

Programme Announcements and Information Forums: Canvas is an e-facility to check on programme and module announcements, and staff information, download readings and lecture notes, upload all assessments, and obtain marks and grades. THIS IS THE MAIN MEDIUM OF COMMUNICATION BETWEEN THE PROGRAMME COORDINATOR AND DIRECTORS, AND ALL TEACHING STAFF, WITH ALL SECOND-YEAR STUDENTS. YOU MUST ENSURE THAT YOU HAVE ACCESS TO THE CANVAS SYSTEM AS SOON AS POSSIBLE AT THE BEGINNING OF SEMESTER ONE.

Email Policy: Please <u>only use your student email account for communicating with all</u> <u>Schools, Disciplines and programme personnel</u>. Mail from all other e-mail addresses will not, normally, receive a response.

Students are expected to <u>regularly check their student e-mail account for all</u> <u>announcements and notices</u>. You should also regularly check your 'junk mail' folder.

Students should also demonstrate courtesy and respect at all times when communicating through their e-mail accounts. Please remember that you are in an academic environment and should address members of staff by their appropriate titles in all communications. If your absence relates to other circumstances, it is your responsibility to also communicate this in a timely way with your module co-ordinator, and/or with the relevant year co-ordinator or Dr Rachel McArdle, Second Year Programme Coordinator. If you are experiencing difficulties in keeping up with coursework during the year for whatever reason you are strongly advised to let us know about this while there is time to offer constructive advice and assistance. If we are not aware of issues until near the end of a module it is usually very difficult to provide real and practical support and help. You will find that we are very approachable and willing to be accommodating and in making your situation known to us we will regard you as having acted maturely and responsibly. It is our fervent wish to see you perform to the best of your ability and enjoy the entire four-year programme of study.

Work Placements: During the academic year, the BASS Programme Team will begin discussing the 3rd year placement semester with all second-year students. We would encourage you to begin thinking about possible placement opportunities and interests you may wish to pursue as early as possible. In addition, we would ask that you consider whether you wish to conduct your placement in Ireland or abroad. If you wish to conduct your placement in Europe we recommend that you participate in any training or events offered by the Erasmus office in 2022/2023. The second Year Coordinator will bring these to your attention as they arise during the year.

Some Brief Information on the Placements: Students will pursue a placement for 5 months, from January until the end of May of the 3rd Year of the BASS Programme. Students must be available **32 hours per week** for the duration of the placement.


Contribution of Work Placement to Final Degree Classification: All placements must be passed to be awarded the degree BSc (Social Sciences) at the University of Galway. Placements will be graded on a pass-fail basis. A placement will bear 30 ECTS credits.

- 1. As such, if a student passes the placement the result will not affect final degree classification.
- 2. If a student fails their placement, they cannot progress to year four of the degree programme.

Module Description

Sustainability is one of the core values of the University of Galway and we adopt a Learn-Live-Lead approach to sustainability. This module - Introduction to Sustainability - is futureoriented and explores the concept of sustainability in the face of global change. It encompasses a wide range of theory and practice, including social, economic and environmental issues, and links international examples to local context and relevance. Students will be encouraged and supported to engage critically with the concept of sustainable development and to critically unpack the meaning of the global goals from a social science perspective. Guest lecturers who are experts in various aspects of sustainability and critical social science will complement this approach. Critical inquiry, discovery, reading, writing and discussion in the social sciences will be a central focus.

Learning Outcomes

On successful completion of this module, the learner will be able to:

- Define and explain key aspects of sustainability
- Critically assess existing evidence in relation to how sustainability can best be promoted, in particular in the face of global change and uncertainty
- Evaluate approaches employed to lead on environmental issues and the impacts they have
- Apply and appraise sustainable approaches that are used to help reduce environmental pressures and promote sustainability
- Recommend appropriate practices to create a sustainable environment.

The course is designed to encourage learning through attendance at lectures, class discussions, and 'learning by doing' through the use of applied case studies and group work. Wide and critical reading is encouraged.

Module Description

The primary aims of the fieldtrip module are:

- To introduce students to the economic, political, social and cultural nuances of Barcelona
- To support individual and group study and learning by providing an active environment and a variety of exercises
- To encourage effective communication, group work, critical thinking, reflection, and practical research skills in a field-based context
- To examine key features of field-based and cooperative learning and its applicability in the social sciences
- To utilise an applied learning approach to link theoretical principles to realworld contexts and assist in the creation of applied social scientists
- To consider the four BASS streams in an applied field-based setting
- To consider critically the role of cooperative and group learning in the applied social sciences.

Learning Outcomes

The course has the following main objectives:

- To examine key features of cooperative learning and its applicability in the social sciences
- To employ a series of well-recognised research methods in an international field class, To utilise an applied learning approach to link theoretical principles to real-world contexts and assist in the creation of applied social scientists
- To consider critically the role of cooperative and group learning in the applied social sciences
- To support individual study and research by providing an active environment for a critical field-based learning environment
- To consider the four BASS streams in an applied field-based setting
- To enable students to develop and apply a range of practical research skills in field-based contexts
- To encourage critical thinking and effective teamwork for the duration of the field exercise.

Frequently Asked Questions

Help with my academic writing?

Students will receive direction and help by way of in-class tasks, assignments, and essay structure advice, from their module/seminar tutors/teachers and fellow students. Many small seminars are designed to develop a student's academic writing and guidelines are provided in relevant discipline handbooks. Further help is available to all students in the form of the Academic Writing Centre (contact the library directly or email writingcentre@universityofgalway.ie).

Do I need to stick to the word limit on my essays?

The word limits are given for a specific reason in each case so it is important to aim for the particular word count instructed. Penalties will apply if the word count is more than <u>10% below or above the word limit</u>. These word limits relate to the main text <u>so</u> excludes the title, bibliography and footnotes.

Can I email assignments and essays?

No: <u>email submission of examinable material is not accepted nor admissible</u>. All examinable materials are required to be uploaded through Turnitin on Canvas and a digital receipt, plus the relevant submission form, handed to the lecturer/tutor on the proposed submission date.

How can I find out about Turnitin?

Academic Integrity Policy

The Policy states, 'Academic misconduct is any attempt to gain or help others gain an unfair academic advantage'. This can be 'intentional or inadvertent', and can be committed in a variety of ways (University of Galway 2022).

The following examples of academic misconduct are quoted from the University Policy (please note that this is not an exhaustive list):

- 'Submitting work as your own for assessment, which has, in fact, been done in whole or in part by someone else'
- 'Cheating in exams (e.g., crib notes, copying, using disallowed tools, impersonation)'
- 'Cheating in projects (e.g., collusion; using 'essay mills' to carry out the allocated part of the project)'
- 'Self-plagiarism where you submit work which has previously been submitted for a different assignment without permission/acknowledgement'
- 'Posting advertisements for services which encourage contract cheating either physically or virtually'
- 'Submitting all or part of an assessment item which has been produced using artificial intelligence (e.g. Google Translate or other machine translation services/software, AI essay writing service etc.) and claiming it as your own work.'

What is the procedure for dealing with conflict or querying my marks and grades?

Your first port-of-call is to make contact with your module tutor, teacher or lecturer. There may be issues that you are not considering when calculating your marks, for example. If you are still unhappy, you should go directly to the second-year programme coordinator or any of the programme directors (Prof. France Fahy or Dr Mike Hynes). If you are still unhappy, you can appeal directly to the College of Arts, Social Science and Celtic Studies: Catherine McCurry is the direct contact in this instance (email <u>catherine.mccurry@universityofgalway.ie</u>).

What do I do if I run into difficulties with time to submit an assignment or essay?

We all can run into difficulties from time to time so your first pot-of-call, again, is your module tutor, teacher or lecturer BEFORE THE STATED DEADLINE. He/she may be in a position to give you an extension on the submission of your assignment or essay based on documented medical evidence or for other exceptional circumstances. If this is not possible, you should contact the School or Department Year Coordinator (or indeed the Programme Coordinator) to make your request. It is important to note that penalties may apply to such extension so please consult the module handbook in each particular case.

Do I have to register for Canvas?

Students are automatically enrolled on Canvas once registered with the University. Your courses will then appear once you log on with your username and password. It is advisable to confirm your access to Canvas before needing it for important module information, online contributions, or deadlines.
